On 22 January at Rorke's Drift on the Natal border with Zululand, in South Africa, a tiny British garrison of men - many of them sick and wounded - fought for 12 hours to repel repeated attacks by up to 3,000 Zulu warriors. The left horn started to engage Durnford, who conducted a fighting retreat back to camp.

The Centre Column reached Isandlwana on 20th January and encamped on its slope. The captured Natal Native Contingent soldiers were regarded as traitors by the Zulu and executed. And behind that imagined threat was the looming specter of a general native uprising against the white population.

It is thought that natives living in Natal came down to the river and, on theurg of the king's absence, civil war ensued. The last survivor of the main battle, a soldier of the 24th, escaped to a cave on the hillside where he continued fighting until his ammunition gave out and he was shot .
